# Purple Teddies

#### **Sharing a Picnic**

Make a picnic for you and your teddies or favourite toys and share your picnic food. Make sure all of your toys get the same number of lovely treats each. Write down how many of each item you have given to each of your toys to check that they are the same.








#### **Bug Hotels**

Make your own Bug Hotel by filling a small box with empty toilet/kitchen rolls and add grass and sticks. Another way of making a bug hotel is by asking an adult to cut the bottle off an empty milk container. You can then fill it with lots of things you find in your garden or while on a walk.


You can either fill the hotel with plastic bugs, or see how many real bugs come to stay in the hotel!

#### **Number Rhymes**

Practise writing numbers – see if you you can remember the rhyme that we have learnt for each number as you first trace it in the air with your finger, then write it down saying the rhyme as you write.

#### **Cloud Dough**

2 cups of flour ¼ cup vegetable oil Food colouring

For a sensory experience mix the food colouring into the oil before mixing with the flour. Add measuring scoops, bowls, spoons or even Small World characters and allow your children to explore!

**Loose Part Shapes** 

Use loose parts to fill in the outlines of shapes. Can you name the shape? How many sides does it have? How many corners?



#### **Button Flowers**

Use buttons to make flowers. You could stick them onto a card to give or post to a loved one.



# **Cotton Bud Skeletons**

Cotton buds make fantastic dinosaur skeletons! Can you find out some more information about your chosen dinosaur using the internet or a book? What sound does your dinosaur's name begin with?



#### **Counting Sets**

Ask a grown up to write numbers to 10 on empty tubes (toilet roll tubes work well for this!) Can you count the right number of objects into each tube?

#### Can you find...?

Look at the picture and ask your child to find an object or animal.


For example: Can you see some rabbits? How many can you find? Can you find a butterfly? Are there any more to see? You could ask them who they think lives in the houses and help them to try and make up a story.

This supports your child with developing their concentration, language and counting. Try this with pictures from books you have or with scenes you see when you're out for a walk. What can you see?

#### **Shapes**

Can you find objects that look like a triangle?

How many can you find?



Try this song to help you with this shape. It goes to the tune of 'The farmers in his den'

# **Positional Language**

Introduce positional language using a toy and a cup. Begin by giving simple simple instructions such as "Put the toy 'in front of' the cup." Gradually introduce 'under', 'above' 'behind', 'beside' and 'between'. You could try this with a ball outside — asking your child to place the ball in different places. Have fun!

# **Threading**


Stick a piece of dried spaghetti into a ball of dough. Pour a bowl of cheerios or other 'o' shaped cereal and encourage your child to thread onto the spaghetti.



#### **Animal Rescue**

Use Washi tape or masking tape to tape toys to a flat surface. Ask your child to rescue the toys! This is great for fine motor development.





Use a ladle or large spoon to fish for items such as bottle tops in a bowl of water or the sink.

# **Fine Motor Skills**

Thread pipe cleaners through the holes of a colander one by one. You can weave in and out of holes.

Tape your colander on a flat surface like a table so your child can concentrate.

Encourage your child to pull out the pipe cleaners one by one.



### **Shape Puzzle**

Draw around household items or toys to make a simple shape puzzle. Encourage your child to match up the items to their outlines.
